Confederate soldiers could not be buried in national cemeteries, nor were they afforded any benefits from the United States Government for many decades after the end of the

Civil War. Private organizations specifically women's organizations established in former Confederate states after the war, assumed responsibility for Confederate reburials.

The Federal Government first became involved in permanently marking Confederate graves in 1906. That year, Congress authorized' the furnishing of headstones for Confederate soldiers who died in Federal prisons and military hospitals in the North, and were buried near their places of confinement. The act also established the Commission for Marking Graves of Confederate Dead, whose job it was to ensure that the graves of Confederate soldiers in the North received markers.

Today, three Federal agencies manage 157 national cemeteries.

The SCV Guardian Program is in place to honor our Confederate Ancestors. Consider taking part in this worthwhile program.



HISTORICAL DATES IN APRIL



1836

April 21 - The Battle of San Jacinto, Texas. Led by General Samuel Houston, the Texan Army engaged and defeated General Antonio López de Santa Anna's Mexican army in a fight that lasted just 18 minutes.

1861

April 11 – Confederate General P.G.T. Beauregard calls for Fort Sumter to surrender. Union Major Robert Anderson refuses his demand.

April 12 - At 4:30AM, a gun from Fort Johnson fires a star shell that detonates above Fort Sumter signaling the surrounding gun batteries to begin shelling the Union-held fort.

April 16 - President Lincoln calls on all states in the Union to cease doing business with those southern states that have moved to secede.

1862

April 4 - The Peninsular Campaign begins under the leadership of Union General George McClellan (Army of the Potomac).

April 6 - The Battle of Shiloh begins in Hardin County, Tennessee. Union generals Ulysses S. Grant and Don Buell lead a force of some 63,000 against 40,335 Confederates led by generals Beauregard and Albert Johnston.

April 24 – The CSS Stonewall Jackson, launched in January of 1862, is driven ashore and burned by Union Navy elements.

1863

April 5 - It is revealed that thousands of Confederate prisoners have died in captivity at Camp Douglas in Chicago, Illinois.

April 17 - General Benjamin Grierson of the Union Army undertakes a series of cavalry raids against Confederate positions beginning at LaGrange, Tennessee.

April 27 - Confederate forces are successful in driving back a Union navy attack at Grand Gulf, Mississippi.

April 30 - The Battle of Chancellorsville begins in Spotsylvania County, Virginia. Union forces are directed by General Hooker while the Confederates are led by general's Lee and Jackson.

1864

April 2 - Cavalry units, under the leadership of Union General James H. Wilson, capture Selma, Alabama.

April 8 - Confederate forces at Sabine Crossroads along the Red River stop, and drive back, a Union advance.

April 9 - Pleasant Hill, Louisiana is the site of a Union victory over Confederate elements as the Red River Campaign advances. Union General Nathaniel Banks directs the victors.

April 12 - Fort Pillow, Tennessee, is the site of a Confederate victory by General Nathan Bedford.

April 19 – The USS Southfield falls victim to an attack by The CSS Albemarle near Plymouth, North Carolina. The Southfield is sunk in the act.

April 25 - Marks's Mills, Arkansas is the site of a Confederate capture of over 200 Union supply wagons.

1865

April 1 - The Battle of Five Forks is fought between forces of General Sheridan and General Pickett near Petersburg, Virginia.

April 2 - The Battle of Fort Blakely begins in Baldwin County, Alabama.

April 6 - The Battle of Sailor's Creek (or Sayler's) takes place between Union General Philip Sheridan and his 26,000-strong army against Generals Richard Ewell and John Gordon of the Confederacy.

April 9 - The Battle of Appomattox Court House takes place marking one of the final engagements of the American Civil War. The battle is a decisive Union victory and sees General Lee surrender his Army of Northern Virginia to General Grant.

April 14 - On this date (Good Friday), President Lincoln is shot by actor John Wilkes Booth during the play "Our American Cousin" at the Ford's Theater in Washington, D.C.

GREAT LOCOMOTIVE CHASE

The Great Locomotive Chase (also known as the Andrews' Raid or Mitchel Raid) was a military raid that occurred April 12, 1862, in



northern Georgia during the American Civil War. Volunteers from the Union Army, led by civilian scout, James J. Andrews,

commandeered a train, *The General*, and took it northward toward Chattanooga, Tennessee, doing as much damage as possible to the vital Western and Atlantic Railroad` line from Atlanta to Chattanooga as they went. They were pursued by

Confederate forces at first on foot, and later on a succession of locomotives, including *The Texas*, for 87 miles (140 km).

Because the Union men had cut the telegraph wires, the Confederates could not send warnings ahead to forces along the railway. Confederates eventually captured the raiders and quickly executed some as spies, including Andrews;

BATTLE OF MANSFIELD

The Battle of Mansfield, also known as the Battle of Sabine Crossroads, occurred on April 8, 1864, in De Soto Parish, Louisiana. Confederate forces commanded by Major General Richard Taylor attacked Union forces commanded by Major General Nathaniel P. Banks a few miles outside the town of Mansfield, near Sabine Crossroads. The Union forces held their positions for a short time before being overwhelmed by Confederate attacks and driven from the field. The battle was a decisive Confederate

victory which stopped the advance of the Union army's Red River Campaign during the American Civil War.

The Union forces had suffered 113 killed, 581 wounded and 1,541 captured as well as the loss of 20 cannon, 156 wagons, and a thousand horses and mules killed or captured.

Confederate loss was "about 1,000 killed and wounded" at Mansfield, but precise details of Confederate losses were not recorded. Those who died of wounds there were interred without markers in the historic Minden Cemetery. They were finally recognized with markers erected on March 25, 2008.

THE SAN JACINTO MONUMENT



The monument, constructed between 1936 and 1939 and dedicated on April 21, 1939, is the world's tallest masonry column and is part of the San Jacinto Battleground State Historic Site. The San Jacinto Monument is 567.31-feet-high

and is topped with a 220-ton star that commemorates the site of the Battle of San Jacinto, the decisive battle of the Texas Revolution.



On this field on April 21, 1836 the Army of Texas commanded by General Sam Houston, and

accompanied by the Secretary of War, Thomas J. Rusk, defeated the larger invading army of Mexicans under General Santa Anna.

OPERATION LONE STAR

The southern border continues to worsen as the Biden administration's immigration policies allow for scores of illegal aliens to enter the United States. As the pressure builds on states and localities bearing the brunt of President Joe Biden's immigration agenda, local leaders are stepping up to prioritize their constituents' safety.

On March 6, Texas Governor Greg Abbott (R) and the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) set in motion Operation Lone Star to curb the smuggling of illegal aliens and drugs into the 'state. The enforcement initiative combines DPS and the Texas National Guard. Utilizing air, ground, marine and tactical border security to monitor vulnerable areas and prevent Mexican cartels and other criminals from transporting illicit narcotics and smuggling migrants.

Governor Abbott explained the impetus for the operation, saying, "The crisis at our southern border continues to escalate because of Biden Administration policies that refuse to secure the border and invite illegal immigration." He continued, "Texas supports legal immigration but will not be an accomplice to the open border policies that cause, rather than prevent, a humanitarian crisis in our state and endanger the lives of Texans. We will surge resources and law enforcement personnel needed to confront this crisis."

The Confederate flag is the last flag to represent the concept of local control of ones' life in America. In a larger sense it represents the same values and principles as the original U.S. Betsy Ross Flag: Limited Constitutional Federal Government, States Rights, Resistance to Tyranny, and Christian Principles and Values. Thus it represents "government of the people, by the people, and for the people with the consent of the governed".

IMPACT OF THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC

It has now been a year since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, which has claimed millions of lives and changed the ways in which each of us relates to and navigates the world. Local and international restrictions meant to curb the spread of COVID-19, have included stay at home orders, travel bans, restrictions on meeting people from other` households, and the closure of nonessential stores, as well as gyms, cinemas, museums, art galleries, and even places of worship.

Research has shown that economic insecurity has a "substantial" negative effect on mental health and that worries about future finances seem to have the greatest effect. These concerns seem to hit men particularly hard, as they may be more inclined to feel that they have to fulfill the role of the "breadwinner" for their families.

In the U.S., the National Home Education Research Institute offers a "conservative estimate" of a "10% growth in the absolute number of homeschool students during [the] 2020–2021 school years." A concern is that the longer children remain out of school, the less likely they are to return.

In a perspective piece published in *World Psychiatry* in January 2021, Prof. Julianne Holt-Lunstad, a psychologist at Brigham Young University, in Provo, Utah, argues that social isolation has become a pandemic in its own right, posing health threats that should not be ignored by policymakers or national authorities.

Social isolation and loneliness can result in both short and long-term health effects that cannot be ignored. The lethal effects of social isolation and loneliness may be more immediate, in the case of suicide or domestic violence, or more long-term, in the case of disease-related deaths. Perceived social isolation is having a significant negative effect on the well-being of adults of all ages.

With the advent of COVID-19 vaccines there is renewed hope that the world will open up in due course.
