The Role of the SCV

There are numerous organizations which support the South and Southern heritage. Some advocate a new secession and a renewed effort toward independence. Others do political work. Still others are purely educational, trying to show people the true facts. Many people are in several organizations. The SCV is unique in this effort. First, the SCV is the true legacy of the Confederate States of America. The SCV are not only the actual descendants of the original Confederates, but the SCV was created by them in 1896 and, later, in 1927, the surviving veterans voted to give all records, materials, Flags, symbols and remnants of the Confederate States of America to the SCV as their legitimate heirs. The SCV today is the only legitimate organization to interpret the efforts of their ancestors and the symbols they created. That fact is clearly recognized and supported by the Sons of Union Veterans of

the Civil War (SUVCW). Because of this role, the SCV frequently finds itself in the public eye and particularly in the media. It is vital that SCV members understand represent their ancestors and have a duty to relate history as related by their ancestors. In his book, A Southern View of the Invasion of the Southern States and the War of 1861 – 1865, Captain Sam Ashe of North Carolina, succinctly lays out the Southern side of the conflict. All who defend Confederate Veterans should have a reprint of his book. He was the official spokesman for the United Confederate Veterans Association (UCV).

In Pursuit of Liberty (1765)

Without a reminder, the human mind simply forgets. Thomas Paine wrote, "It is at all times necessary... that we frequently refresh our patriotism by reference to first principles." Writing about America's first settlers, John Adams reminded his readers of the Puritan's courageous pursuit of liberty. "It was this great struggle [between the people and tyranny] that peopled America. It was not religion alone, as is commonly supposed; but it was a love of

universal liberty, and hatred, a dread, a horror, of [tyranny]... [The Puritans] had been so vexed and tortured by the powers of those days, for no other crime than their knowledge and their freedom of inquiry... that they at last resolved to fly to the wilderness for refuge...

It may be thought polite and fashionable by many modern fine gentlemen, perhaps, to deride the characters of these persons... But such ridicule is... grossly injurious and false. Religious to some degree of enthusiasm it may be admitted they were; but this can be no peculiar derogation [dishonor] from their character... Whatever imperfections may be justly ascribed to them... their judgment in framing their policy was founded in wise, humane, and benevolent principles... Tyranny in every form, shape, and their disdain appearance was and abhorrence; no fear of punishment, nor even of death itself in exquisite tortures, had been sufficient to conquer that steady, manlv [courageous], pertinacious [unshakeable] spirit with which they had opposed the tyrants of those days in church and state... they saw clearly, that popular powers must be placed as a guard, a control, a balance... in every government, or else it would soon become... a great and detestable system of fraud, violence, and usurpation."


