In 1906 General Stephen D. Lee,

On June 23, 1864, Lee was appointed a lieutenant general, making him the youngest man to reach the rank in the Confederate Army. He took command of General John B. Hood's former corps within the Army of Tennessee.

The origination of the Guardian Program

Proverbs 11:29

"He that troubleth his own house shall inherit the wind"...

By not honoring and protecting our forebears we are doomed to lose everything.

The original Guardian Program began in the early 1990's in the South Carolina Division. The Guardian Program was instituted to give recognition to Compatriots that have demonstrated their commitment to preserving, protecting and honoring the final resting place of a Confederate Veteran.

In the mid 2000's, National Headquarters of the SCV created a National Guardian Program utilizing the South Carolina Division's Guardian rules and guidelines as its model.

Our Confederate Veteran magazine, in 2011, printed an article about the Guardian Program. Shortly thereafter, Larry Davis

(son of Past Guardian Chairman Phil Davis) a member of the South Carolina Division, contacted Commander Davis and asked whether the Texas Division had

a Guardian Program and whether or not I was a member. Phil had to admit that he read the article, however the Texas Division

did not have a Guardian Program. Furthermore, after reading the article and talking to Larry, Phil had done nothing about it.

Phil then contacted then Texas Division Commander, Granville Block and discussed the aspects of having a Guardian Program in Texas. Commander Block agreed with the need for a Guardian Program and placed Phil on the March 2012 DEC Agenda to discuss the importance of such a program and the desire to have it in the Texas Division.

At that meeting, The Guardian Program was approved and Commander Block appointed Commander Davis as the Texas Division Guardian Chairman. Fortunately, the South Carolina Division took pity on him and made a copy of their rules and guidelines, along with their medal design and documents so as to avoid reinventing the wheel. Minor modifications to their rules, guidelines, application, and medal were made to suit our Division.

What was the need for and why be a part of the Guardian Program?

The Guardian Program was and is the next step beyond the Graves Registration program. The Graves Registration Program sought only to locate and identify the final resting places of Confederate Heroes, known and unknown. The Guardian Program ensures that these final resting places are catalogued, maintained in a good state of repair and appearance, while providing that appropriate monuments plaques, and stones) (flags, the Confederate Hero are present in honor of his service.

When we fail to honor our forebears we do a disservice and thus are a problem within our own house and will ultimately lose everything and "inherit the wind".

The SCV Guardian Program honors the Fallen.

STONEWALL JACKSON;S PRAYER BELIEFS

Stonewall Jackson believed that if anyone

came before the Searcher of hearts, with sincere motives for light and guidance, he was sure to receive it. It was because he believed so strongly in Providence that

he believed so strongly in prayer.

The Scriptures teach that prayer should occur throughout the day, "Evening, and morning, and at noon, will I pray, and cry aloud: and he shall hear my voice" (Psalm 55:17). Prayer is our direct communication with the Lord. It should be the cornerstone of our daily living, and a custom so familiar to us that we need not question if we are abounding in our prayers.

Through our prayers, we praise the Lord, seek His will and guidance, ask for understanding, and acknowledge our sins.

Prayer remained one of the most deciding parts of the general's fame. He once said, "I have so fixed the habit in my own mind that I never raise a glass of water to my lips without lifting my heart to God in thanks and prayer for the water of life."
